







Making The Case for Art Education in Schools

The Facts:

A creative education not only gives young people access to a wider selection of future jobs and increases their employability, but actually helps them perform better in other school subjects too. The arts also have a hugely positive impact on mental health, confidence and wellbeing.

- Participation in structured arts activities can increase cognitive abilities by 17%.
- Learning through arts and culture develops skills and behaviour that lead children to do better in school.
- Students from low-income families who take part in arts activities at school are three times more likely to get a degree.
- Employability of students who study arts subjects is higher, and they are more likely to stay in employment

- The Creative Industries contributed £115.9bn in GVA to the UK economy in 2019, which is greater than aerospace, automotive, life sciences and oil and gas sectors combined.
- It is growing at four times the rate of the UK economy as a whole and experienced strong growth in all parts of the UK.
- Almost 1 in 8 UK businesses are creative businesses and 95% of these employ 9 people or fewer.

The number of hours that art and design are taught in state schools decreased by 16.5% between 2012 and 2017, according to analysis by the National Society for Education in Art and Design.

Two thirds (68%) of primary school teachers in England say there is less arts education now than in 2010, and half (49%) say the quality of what there is has got worse.

- There are 20% fewer art teachers in secondary schools since 2010.
- Primary school children often get no art teaching from one term to the next.
- 97% of National Union of Teachers members agreed that SATS preparation did not support children's access to a broad and balanced curriculum.
